# CRCJ 8040: Police & Society Fall 2017 Tuesday 5:30 – 8:10PM CPACS 122

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Office Hours: Tuesday 3 – 5PM or by appointment

#### **Course Description**

This course is designed to explore the role of the police in American society. Attention is given to the origins of policing, the nature of police organizations and police work, and patterns of relations between the police and the public. The values of a democratic society as they affect the law enforcement role are discussed.

## **Required Readings**

All of the required readings are available on Canvas. I expect you to read critically and come prepared to discuss how the material relates to contemporary policing and society. You are encouraged to bring in additional material as you see fit (e.g., news articles, video clips, other articles/books you are familiar with).

#### **Writing Assignments**

You are required to write three reaction papers throughout the semester. These should be 2-3 pages (double-spaced), and each is worth 5% of your grade. You may write a reaction paper for any of the readings marked with an asterisk (see "Course Schedule" below), but you may only write one reaction paper for any given week.

#### **Research Proposal and Presentation**

Each student will select a topic on which to write a research proposal and make an oral presentation to the class based upon its content. The written proposal should be 10-15 pages (double-spaced) and the oral presentation should be 10-15 minutes (or 20 including Q&A). The written proposal is due no later than **November 21**<sup>st</sup>, and oral presentations will take place during our last two classes. We will discuss this assignment in more detail later in the semester. Topics must be approved by me, and should be submitted in writing (approx. one page) no later than **October 3**<sup>rd</sup>.
